s the summer holidays loom into view, the 1st Battalion can look forward to a fantastic programme for the remainder of 2023 that holds some tremendously exciting prospects. The soldiers of 1 R YORKS are committed to operational outputs on a broad front for the rest of this year. Burma Company are deployed on Op SHADER in Iraq currently, and are doing a superb job as part of the coalition forces in Erbil. Corunna Company will take over from them in September, and Foxhound crews from Alma Company are held at readiness and prepared to join NATO's strategic reserve in Kosovo. Meanwhile, the Battalion Headquarters, Alma Company and Quebec Company will be held at extremely high readiness as one of the United Kingdom Standby Battalions. Quebec Company soldiers will also get the opportunity to join our 4th Battalion on exercise in the United States, and 4 SCOTS in Morocco later this Autumn. Looking ahead, 2024 holds just as much in store, and crucially will bring the entire Battalion together with a singular purpose: first, for an extended deployment to Oman on Ex DESERT KHANJAR starting in January; and then onto the Battalion's first Battlegroup validation in over six years on Ex WESSEX STORM in June.

The battalion can also reflect upon a very successful first half of 2023, that has seen the Rifle Companies successfully complete their conversion to Light Mechanised infantry, and the support weapons platoons get to grips with their new Jackal vehicles and heavy weapons. PROJECT VERTUO

July 2023 saw Combat Team 2 (CT2) from Burma Coy, support the Minister for Armed Forces in launching the Defence Command Paper Refresh (DCPR) 2023 on Lulworth Ranges in Dorset. The Exercise was designed to show how Britain intends to fight and win in an increasingly contested and volatile world.

Combat Team 2 were charged with delivering the final assault to demonstrate combined arms integration whilst utilising the latest technology from the 'Human Machine Teaming Project'. This enhanced force package included using Uncrewed Aerial Systems (UAS - drones) to support locating the enemy, Uncrewed Ground Vehicles (UGV) with ISR, CASEVAC and armed capabilities (including a 50-Calibre machine gun) to support the close fight, electric bikes and MRAZRs to increase reach and Enhanced **Dismounted Situational Awareness** (EDSA) systems to assist commanders' decision making at all levels. The new equipment which 2 R YORKS are charged with developing is genuinely game changing, allowing the Next



Generation Combat Team of the Army to improve lethality for the Army.

Supporting CT2 were AJAX ground reconnaissance vehicles, Challenger 2 Main Battle Tanks, Wolfram, Boxer, Apache helicopters and a F35 fighter jet. This presented the soldiers of Burma with the opportunity to better understand the systems which will support them in the future as the Army continues mobilise and modernise – led by the team at 2 R YORKS!

The Battalion has worked hard, against uncertainty, but supported strengthening the outstanding reputation that The Royal Yorkshire Regiment already holds. We have optimised the opportunities to gain advantage and gain alliances – with allies and industry. This has delivered and bought recognition from our US and European Allies, through CGS's RUSI speech, and through the DCPR.



But change is essential and uncertainty must be managed. 2 R YORKS remain committed to our task and delivering the capabilities we deserve for the future. *'Fortune Favours the Brave'*

collaboration with Care After Combat. The RYRA recently supported the Care After Combat fund raiser bike night at the Castle Café, Withernsea; the night consisted of a charity auction, sale of Care After Combat merchandise and several very generous donations which resulted in a total of almost £2,500 raised for this great charity. The RYRA has also answered the call to directly support the charity by signing up as volunteer mentors. Five members of the Regimental Family are awaiting training and DBS checks and will then be directly involved in prison forums, prison visits and supporting veterans after release from custody.

Benevolence requests continue to be received, and in the most part funded, for the entire Regimental Family – the majority of cases relate to our veterans but not exclusively and we have recently funded a number of flights to Fiji to enable members of both the 1st and 2nd Battalions to attend family funerals. The funding of benevolence cases would not be possible without the contribution from serving soldiers through the One Days Pay Scheme and I urge anyone not already signed up to the scheme to make this a priority – you never know when you may need support yourself.

Our activity based branches continue to thrive; the Millennium Branch, the Fishing Branch and the Riders Branch forthcoming events include the Mission Motorsport day at Croft Circuit on 22 Aug (which is a free event open to all serving soldiers and veterans, whether you are a member of the Association Branches or not), a fishing match at the Land of Nod on 13 Aug and Ride to the Wall at the National Memorial Arboretum on 7 Oct. The geographical branches have also been busy supporting our home towns during the Armed Forces Day celebrations and Middlesbrough Branch also managed to run a black tie Coronation Dinner on the 6 May 23. We will also have a marching

contingent taking part in the London Cenotaph Parade on 12 Nov 23.
